# Report of February 4, 2016 8th Fire presentation

We had a **most** successful evening at St. Columba Church. Almost 20 of us gathered to watch several 5 minute vignettes created by various film makers from across Canada. Chief Michael Recalma of the Qualicum First Nation and Rosie McLeod-Shannon, District 69 Principal of First Nations Education joined us.

The topics ranged from teenage suicides on the Pikangikum Reservation in Northern Ontario (58 suicides between 2001 & 2009!), to the history and meaning of the Wampum Belt Treaties that were signed with the intent of "peace, friendship and good minds" connecting indigenous and non-indigenous hands together; these are treaties that still stand today. They were intended to last "as long as the grass grows, the rivers flow and the sun gives light."

In another vignette we learned the legend and meaning of the 8th Fire; an internal fire of peace and good will found within people who are willing to reach out to each other across cultural boundaries and as Wab Kinew says "Now is the time".

We also saw a most moving 'Red Dress Art Installation' in the magnificent Manitoba Legislative Building in Winnipeg. Each beautiful and different empty scarlet red dress hung in the vast spaces of the building represented a missing or murdered indigenous woman. Quite stunning.

The evening's participants were led by Irene Champagne. She is a compassionate, pragmatic and knowledgeable person willing to extend herself to help others to understand and to speak up. After tea and (the wonderful) apricot bread we formed our chairs into a circle and had an excellent conversation/comment session. People left feeling they **had** reached out and learned from each other.

### **Global Outreach Research/Report**

Fulfilling a long-standing promise, the Global Outreach committee reports, as below.

Graduate Women International (formerly IFUW) has 12 or 13 programs, Bina Roy being one of them. We had a look at each of them. Out of the complete list we have briefly described three.

- 1. <u>Bina Roy Partners in Development</u>: Grants are awarded to GWI national federations from developing countries on a competitive basis. Currently there are only two listed: Nigeria and Sierra Leone.
  - a. Nigeria to enable illiterate women to gain business skills to make their activities financially viable.
  - b. Sierra Leone to improve life skills and health education for female university students.
- 2. <u>The Uwicyeza Project: Gender Education in Rwanda</u>: programs provide secondary school girls with critical knowledge and practical skills for their own professional development.
- 3. <u>Teachers for Rural Futures</u>: provides scholarships and mentoring support to young women from rural areas of Uganda for them to become qualified teachers and ambassadors for girls' education.

Of these three we strongly recommend the last.

It is strongly supported by GWI.

It fits the mission statement of CFUW to promote the education of girls and women.

The funds are managed in the same way as Bina Roy.

Information about the program is plentiful and easily obtained through the GWI website.

We recommend that if this project is adopted by this club that

- a. It be continued for at least three years
- b. The amount of the donation be substantially increased.







#### **Book Club News**

The novel And The Birds Rained Down by Jocelyne Saucier resonated with our group.

We enjoyed a spirited discussion on the significance of this Canada Reads contender of 2015, and on the feasibility of its storyline. Comparisons were made with *Ru*, which took the prize.

It was felt strongly that the book was concerned with love and caring for one another. One does fall in love with the characters--we follow them as they make choices about the way they will live, love and die.

Many observations were made about this many-layered book. This atmospheric work caused one reader to feel she was enveloped in the different forms of forest and fire.

The book was translated seamlessly by Rhonda Mullins and was written in part to honour the life of Marie-Ange, the author's aunt.

We do hope for another gem from Canada Reads in 2016, although I am extremely disappointed that *Sweetland* has been relegated to the long list!
