Lessons in Chemistry (2022) by Bonnie Garmus


Home sick, I plucked a book off a pile that was on my 'maybe' list. It looked funny and I needed a change from murder mysteries (my usual comfort fare). It was funny, but it was also smart and was a tonic to read. The Guardian calls it "polished, funny, thought-provoking" and the New York Times calls it "opinionated, funny, and intelligent." Well, can you ask for more?

The year is 1961 and our heroine is Elizabeth Zott, a former research chemist now hosting an afternoon cooking show called *Supper at Six*. Elizabeth is a single mother (a rarity at the time) and she struggles to care for her elementary school-aged daughter, Mad (not short for Madeline, but due to Elizabeth's not hearing the question being asked). She had been sidelined and then fired from her job in chemistry, unfairly discriminated for her daring in being a woman scientist. Although it makes her life hard, she just cannot do other than tell the truth and be herself.

Elizabeth overturns the standard fare of programs 'designed for women' that assume that housewives are completely and solely focussed on children, cleaning, and cooking. She knows that cooking is just chemistry and speaks to her audience as though they are functional human beings with the ability to understand what she says. (Although, the TV station did receive calls asking what CH3 COOH was. It is acetic acid, vinegar in other words). She encourages her audience to take time for themselves and always signs off with: "Children, go set the table. Your mother needs time for herself now." The food she cooks is delicious and healthy. "Take one can of soup" is barred from her lexicon. She advocates for women to fulfil their potential and follow their dreams. That may be all very well now, but in 1961 it was heresy. So soon we forget about the blatant discrimination and patronizing attitudes of the time. Sponsors, the producer, and the program manager despair over her lack of obedience but the audience loves her.


Elizabeth has suffered for her identity as a woman in a non-traditional field. She has been sexually molested, ignored, demoted, overlooked, and her work has been plagiarized. The great love of her life was Mad's father, a scientist as odd as she is. He was brilliant but very much an individual. Unfortunately, he died before they had an opportunity to reconsider their decision not to marry or realize that they were pregnant. The mystery of his background and family is gradually unravelled and owes much to sheer luck and coincidence. A very smart child and a very smart dog are involved but as things eventually evolve, Elizabeth is less alone and less overlooked in her professional field.

If you watched the *Mad Men* TV show (which was set at the same time as this book), you had a refresher course in the attitudes of the time. Women at work fetched the coffee. Women who married stopped working. The cultural expectations of the time resisted change. Women often perpetuated the cultural norm. The world was divided into two genders: one earned the money at work and one stayed at home and raised the children. Anyone trying to disrupt the accepted way of doing things was regarded as dangerously radical and disruptive. You may read this and think, "Goodness, we have come so far." Well, yes, but not without struggle and the work is not done. We who were there at the time can be advocates for education and opportunity for all. We experienced that revolution. Besides, you need a laugh!

Book Culling

When collecting books from the drop-box at Save-on-Foods, or receiving books from neighbours or friends or an estate, **PLEASE** follow these <u>**NEW**</u>^{*} guidelines:

1. DO NOT ACCEPT

- any book with a MILDEW or other smell, or physical damage
- any atlas, community-group cookbook, dictionary, encyclopedia, magazine, medical book, reference book, textbook, or yearbook (Not enough of these books sell to justify the expense of moving and disposing of them; discard them in your garbage.)
- 2. ACCEPT only if in Very Good Condition, regardless of date of publication
 - fiction
 - biography, memoir, autobiography
 - local/BC history especially on lumbering & fishing & First Nations (customers look for these)
- 3. <u>NEW*</u> For all other books, PLEASE check the publication date on the copyright page and

ACCEPT only if the publication date is 2015 or later, and only if in Very Good condition

4. <u>NEW*</u> Do NOT accept DVD's, CD's, or VINYL. (Not enough of these books sell to justify the

expense of moving and disposing of them.)

5. ACCEPT only if in perfect condition

 nice jigsaw puzzles with all the pieces. The pieces must be in a sealed plastic bag, in the box.
