

# From the cfuw Parksville Qualicum Bylaws: What do we do?

- The Chair of Nomination Committee shall present a slate of Officers of the Club, Chair(s) of Committees of the Club, and two Trustees to the CFUW PQ S&BT to the Business meetings of the general membership preceding most closely the Annual General Meeting.
- The Chair of the CFUW PQ S&BT shall inform the President(s) of the name of the Chair for the coming year.
- The election of Officers of the Club and two Trustees to the CFUW PQ S&BT; the appointment of Chairs of Club Committees; and the confirmation of the current Chair of CFUW PQ S&BT shall take place at the Annual General Meeting.

## Why do we have a nominations?

- The term of office for all Officers of the Club is one year.
- The Officers of the Club shall be the President(s), Vice President(s), Secretary(ies), Treasurer(s), Membership Coordinator(s) and the immediate Past President(s).
- No Officer of the Club shall hold the same office for more than two consecutive terms unless approved by vote of the majority of those members attending the AGM where this shall be decided.
- Nominations for Scholarship and Bursary Trust

# From the CFUW Scholarship and Bursary Trust Bylaws

- Trustees shall be recruited from the Active or Life Members of CFUW-PQ and their appointments shall be confirmed at the CFUW-PQ Annual General Meeting.
- An Active Member shall be deemed to be in good standing when she has paid her current annual membership dues of CFUW-PQ.
- A Trustee's term of office shall be four years.
- A retired Trustee may serve a further four-year term after one year's absence.

#### **Book Review of the Month**

Demon Copperhead (2022) by Barbara Kingsolver

I resisted reading this book, despite the many awards the author has received and its 'best-seller' status. For one thing, it is long (546 pages). I had veered away from Kingsolver's books because I felt she served her latest 'cause' instead of just writing an entertaining story. This time, it is the damage that poverty and drug addiction does to children who grow up neglected by their families and society. As you may know, Kingsolver is re-writing Dickens' *David Copperfield*, which exposed the Victorian era's brutal treatment of poor families. If you have read it, or even just read the plot summary (available online) you have the story arc. Even the names are borrowed. In Dickens' book, the bad guy is Uriah Heep and in this one, it is a man known as U-Haul.

As you read, you will learn about rural southern Appalachia, the lack of services, the few options for employment, the limited services. You will also delve deeply into the drug addiction that is a curse and tragedy for many families now. Young Demon was born to an utterly insensibly

stoned single mother who works (when she does) at Walmart and they live in a single-wide trailer on a hill. His father has died. It goes downhill from there, or at least, his life has few redeeming pleasures and scant security. The book is depressing at this point and I found it a real trudge. Demon is also depressed. He shrugs at attending Remedial Math, knowing that next year, he is likely to be with a different family and possibly in a different school. Most of the foster families in this book are exploitive ones, offering substandard care and forcing the children to work. The reader becomes as dispirited as Demon. When he seems to be living in an acceptable home and becomes a football hero, you know it will end. And it does when his knee is wrecked. The team doctor prescribes him oxycodone. And the only way forward is down.

I salute the author for knowing so much about the teenage sub-culture and the common use of drugs of various kinds. She also knows how rare it is to succeed in leaving it behind and how few possibilities there are for help in doing so. She vividly portrays being seized by the everpresent need for a substance and how unthinkable it is to deny it to yourself. You may know someone who has become a victim of that trap.

She revealed to me the stereotype of 'the hillbilly' and how pervasive (and destructive) it is. I unthinkingly read the L'il Abner cartoon and watched the Beverly Hillbillies TV series. Even living so far away, we have an idea in our heads of what these people are like. It is, of course, a rank generalization and massively unfair. Kingsolver not only helps us know and understand the people who live near her, but she also shows us the camaraderie, the generosity, the kindness, and the pleasures of country life.

Like David, Demon is a survivor and eventually, his life improves and he has a possibility of meaningful work, a home, and someone to love. It is a long and rocky road when so much is stacked against you. But, a few good people care and do not stop trying. One helps him come to believe he is worth the effort. One helps him recognize his own strengths. Recalling one of his high school Literature classes, Demon says: "Likewise the Charles Dickens one, seriously old guy, dead, and a foreigner, but Christ Jesus did he get the picture on kids and orphans getting screwed over and nobody giving a rat's ass. You'd think he was from around here."
